Subject:	Community Safety and Policing Act - Provincial Regulations

Recommendation:

That the attached report be received for information purposes.

Information:

Before the Government of Ontario will make the 2019 *Community Safety and Policing Act* into effect (expected Spring 2024), it intends to complete several associated Regulations it considers key to the successful implementation of the Act.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The Ministry of the Solicitor General has released several new draft Regulations. Their impact is summarized in the following chart.

A key change in the new legislation is that police boards become the appointing authority for special constables in their jurisdiction, while the province becomes the 'licensing' agency for non-police agencies wishing to employ Special Constables.
